Notes for Russian Revolution

Before the Russian Revolution....

- Tsarist Russia was falling - economically, socially, politically
 - Tsar Nicholas II and his officials became more isolated, people lost confidence in his power
 - a council of working class leaders revolted against the government
 - Nicholas II abdicated and a provisional government was set up. Nicholas and his family were murdered a year later.
- But..... Revolutionary parties wanted more.....

Bolsheviks/Marxists

- revolutionary parties were divided into two groups: Mensheviks and Bolsheviks - both were communist parties
- Workers saw Marxist/Socialism/Communism as attractive

Summer Crisis and October (Russian) Revolution

- Lenin took over the government in November of 1917 - the worlds first Communist government was established

Revolution and War

- Russia wanted a resolution to war. It wanted peace without annexations but was rejected
