Disputation of Ms R. Bouttell on the Power and Efficacy of the School System

5. The cornerstone idea of the school system is that we are a school where all are equal and therefore we should be free from corrupt authority and coercion.

The Reformation Defined

A Christian reform movement in Europe from the 14th - 17th centuries resulting in the split in Christianity between Roman Catholicism and Protestantism.

Causes of the Reformation

- Anti-Clericalism
- A time of questioning and discussion (more urban centers)
- Appetite for Spiritual Experiences
- Sale of Indulgences – Launched by Pope Leo
- Simony
- Salvation/Humanism – Erasmus and Thomas More worked within the Church and Martin Luther rejected it.
- Belief in Faith Alone (sola fide) and Scripture Alone (sola scripture)
- Growth of Middle Class – reduced power of the Church
